Dear Friends,

We are about to enter the season of Advent which begins on Advent Sunday, 29th November this year. As we will still be in our second lockdown until at least 2nd December, it is going to be an unusual Advent. Yet perhaps the two events do have something in common. Advent is a season of patient waiting and preparation to celebrate the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. Lockdown is also part of a period of patient preparation as we wait for the Covid 19 pandemic to be brought under control and hopefully the roll out of a successful vaccine.

Being patient and waiting is not always easy. At Advent we use Calendars to remind us how close Christmas Day is getting, and we put up decorations such as an Advent wreath as the sense of anticipation builds up. As the dark days of winter continue get shorter all the time, our impatience to celebrate gets worse. Lockdown is also a period of impatient waiting as we look forward to a day when our lives can begin to return to something close to normality. Both can be difficult times, but both encourage us to look forward with hope.

As we hear the messages of the Prophets and John the Baptist, and as we reflect upon the character of Mary and her humble obedience to serve God's purposes, so let us also reflect upon the importance of our faith at this difficult time. Faith gives us the ability to understand God's purposes. Faith informs and inspires us to make the most of adversity. Faith that very soon, our Lord is about to re-enter our world bringing, light and health and peace is the most important gift we can receive and cherish when we feel fragile and overwhelmed by the darkness of the world.

ADVENT SEASON IN THE DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO

It is fascinating how life runs on expectation and hope, it scares me, I am always puzzled and I fail to understand how some men and women in our world can live their lives without hope, and take lightly this available factual story of salvation. I, for one, I find the message of advent i.e. the narrative of the coming of God through a little babe so helpful to understand what life is all about. For me, the story of incarnation makes sense, keeps me full of hope and gives me assurance to live my life meaningfully. It keeps me expectant and reminded of future spectacles and big events that are to come to our world. Advent season is a time when we Christians all over the world remember how our salvation was weaved by God the creator in the life of a fragile infant and time to keep watch.

How is advent celebrated in other parts of the world?

Few thoughts on how the Advent season treats people of the Democratic Republic of the Congo, (DRC), or rather how people in the DRC particularly those in rural villages of 'Kabongo' my own territory of origin, handle the Advent season.

Each year from October to March, DRC, in the centre of Africa, welcomes a lot of downpours because of the equatorial forest, so Christmas is celebrated during a rainy season. Even though each part of the country may have their own way of celebrating Christmas, of course, depending on the size of their Christian population, and weather challenges, the fact remains that Christmas is generally held on December 25th and revered as a Christian public holiday. During Advent season, mainly during the two final weeks of November, everyone is busy preparing.

In other words, and like many Christian countries in the world, Congolese people take Christmas seriously both spiritually and socially as it stands as a special unifying event celebrated by both Christian and non-Christian communities. I think this is because 95% of the population is Christians.

Going to church is usually the main focus of Christmas celebrations in my part of the world and for Christians going to church is a must at Christmas. Processions take place before the church service is held on Christmas Eve, around a big fire as we don't have electricity for light. This is a joyous occasion and a very special time of year, when everyone in the family expects something like a new cloth to wear, a bed sheet or blanket to cover themselves received on the 'Day'.

Decorating churches and homes is common throughout Christian communities in DRC. But no trees with candles, so in village Christmas trees are usually replaced by natural flowers which people go and fetch. Unlike here in the west, where we have electrical and glittering decorations, people have to go in the bush around the village to hunt for wild flowers to adorn churches and their own homes. Nativity scenes are played out, bible narrative of Jesus' birth is sung followed by praises and offering of things like...honey and foodstuff, to the rhythm of drum and musical accompaniment.

On 'Christmas day' you can see everybody hanging out outside in each village feasting, singing and having fun in dancing. After the service on Christmas Day, the celebration starts with a Christmas dinner party: roasted goat meats and chicken. The type of meal will depend on the family's possibility. Generally, families, eat together and culture wants the senior family member to host the celebration, and parents, grandparents, children grandchildren, friends and families, and people in the community be invited to spend time partying together.

There are no mince pies, no haggis nor turkey in Kabongo Territory and the most commonly prepared main dish for Christmas dinner is Ugali/ fufu [maize or cassava meal mixed with very hot water resulting in stiff kind of porridge] eaten with a rooster, goat [or chicken], and side dishes like fried robin or the kind of birds for those who can be lucky during their hunting. Beef and such meat is for families with means; the chance for a family to afford it in my own village is very, very slim.



Giving gifts is a common tradition but the majority of people cannot afford a luxurious thing, but those who are able to, give them out to their own family members, to children, to nieces and nephews. Emphasis is more on the religious celebration of the birth of Jesus than it is on gifts giving.



The most common gift bought for people at this special time of Christmas is new clothes, usually intended to be worn on special occasions and Sundays for going to church. In my rural part of the DRC, few people can afford gifts like gadgets and toys, there are no shops to buy them, and any child who happens to get a doll will be the centre of the whole village attention, really all gifts are usually in the form of clothing, school books, soap, traditional cloth, and other practical goods. Celebration will continue until late.

If advent helps uphold our hope as we look both back at what happened in the past when Jesus came and forward at what the future will be when He comes again, we then need to cling to this vision, to keep watch anxiously lest His future return be a great shock and surprise to us.

Advent time! as a period of waiting, Matthew 24:42-4 describes a difficult part of our existence in relation to God; that is our experience of waiting.

So as Christians we are people who are waiting between Jesus first coming to this world (Christmas) and His second coming to (when Jesus will welcome to usher us in as clearly attested in 1 Thess. 4:16-17). Watch therefore for you do not know what day your Lord will come....You also must be ready.

Sunday 27th December - have as many traditional Christmas Carols as we can cram in!


