It has felt both like a long time and like no time at all since we found out we were stationed to the Blackheath and Crystal Palace circuit. The last few months have been a bit of a whirlwind for Lou and I. Louise has passed her PhD viva and is currently working on the minor corrections she has been set and I have been finishing up my full-time studies at the Queen's Foundation in Birmingham.

The last few weeks have been devoted, however, predominantly to packing for the move and wedding planning. Hopefully by the time this newsletter is distributed both will have gone smoothly! It's not been an ideal, or restful time, prior to moving to the circuit. We had hoped to be married almost a year ago and 21st August 2021 is our third wedding date. It should also make a fun honeymoon to arrive to the Winn Road manse on 23rd August to a raft of unpacked boxes and deconstructed furniture.

The truth is that the last year and a half has not been ideal for anyone, and we have all had to live differently to ever before. Many of us have found ourselves evaluating and reflecting on our lives, considering what the things we cherish are and perhaps realising the areas of life that were draining us.

The same is true for our spiritual lives and the life of the community of the people of God. Many of us have been asking 'what is Church really?', 'where is God and what is God doing?' and 'where is it that I am able to connect with God?' as we have been stripped away from our traditional sense of corporate worship. The reality is that we don't know what 'church' will look like in a post-pandemic world, indeed, we don't even know if we are entering into a post pandemic world. We don't know who will come back to worship, how comfortable people will feel in corporate gatherings, and whether those who come back will have the same understanding of God or the purpose of the Church as they did before. We are, and for sometime will be, in a time of uncertainty, change, and re-evaluation.

This speaks true for Louise and I personally, moving to a new area and away from our support networks. Louise, or 'Dr Gaffney' as I will insist on calling her, begins her working life outside of academia as a structural engineer with AECOM in central London after spending 8 years studying at the University of Newcastle. I begin probationary ministry with much to learn. I bring 8 years of experience working with and alongside religious organisations. I recently spent 3 years working as part of a chaplaincy team on behalf of the Methodist Church with the Armed Forces, prior to that I served as Methodist youth president – a connexional post elected by the children and young people of the Methodist Church, a Methodist Church youth worker, a teaching assistant and volunteering with Christian organisations overseas in Sierra Leone and India. All of these experiences have added skills and passions to my ministry that will influence the minister I am and will become, however, I have never been a presbyter before and have much to learn about the role; I pray for your patience and we navigate this time, and learn together.

In all this change and uncertainty we, personally and corporately, hold on to the promise that God goes before us and with us, that God has a plan for us. I'm excited to see what God's plan has in store for us and hope you are too. As followers of Christ, my prayer is that we are attentive to what God is calling us to, observant to where God is working and courageous enough to step out in faith to serve for the kingdom of God together.

Thank God for life - for all we have created; for every art, designs of hand and mind. Give thanks for skills that lead to new inventions, all the technologies we've yet to find.


Thank God for life - for restlessness of spirit: for liveliness that challenges, explores; for those who look at life and strive for better, rejecting easy answers, wanting more.
